Senkiw Suspension Bridge

(Heritage site, 37.5 kms, 27 minutes south via 59 Hwy)

This bridge, over the Roseau River, was built in 1946 to enable students living on the south side of the river to attend Senkiw School on the north side. It replaced a hand-powered basket and pulley system that had been used nearby since 1916. The bridge, made of locally available materials such as cables wound around old threshing machine cylinders, was used daily by generations of local children.

St-Pierre-Jolys

Welcome-Bienvenue

St-Pierre-Jolys, pop. 1,170 (2016) census), is located on Hwy 59, fifty (50) km south of Winnipeg. The Joubert Creek, a tributary of the Rat River, runs through it and the village is surrounded by the RM of De Salaberry. St-Pierre-Jolys is the bilingual business center of one of Manitoba's most productive farming regions. The town's history predates the province's entry into the Canadian Confederation in 1870, with the arrival of French-Canadian settlers from Quebec as well as the northeastern United States. The French Canadian came after the Métis population and was favored by the Catholic Church.
